hildren and their families are being encouraged to get involved with nature every day in June.

The Wildlife Trusts are running their annual 30 Days Wild campaign and are on course for a record-breaking year after 760,000 people took part in the challenge last year.

Popular activities include wildlifewatching, breakfasting outdoors each day and listening to birdsong. 30 Days Wild fans can take the challenge in different ways – from planting for pollinators to taking on sporting challenges to raise money for The Wildlife Trusts.

Television actor and presenter Cel Spellman is supporting the campaign and said: "30 Days Wild is a brilliant way to explore and develop our relationship with nature and to enjoy new experiences outdoors. "Not just that, the benefits that time in nature has for our physical and mental health are quite amazing.

"I can't wait to get involved this year, and I hope that people of all ages and backgrounds do the same. It's good for the soul and good for nature."

A survey of last year's participants found that taking part in 30 Days Wild improved people's relationship with nature and that it had inspired them to take action.

Almost 90 per cent said they were very likely to make their garden more wildlife-friendly after taking part and 74 per cent said they had either already taken action to reduce their carbon footprint or were very likely to.

50 years of an iconic junction

he city of Birmingham has been celebrating the 50th anniversary of the opening of an extraordinary road junction.

The Gravelly Hill Interchange - better known to everybody as Spaghetti Junction - opened in May 1972, a bewildering collection of roads and flyovers connecting the M6 motorway with the A38, the A38M Aston Expressway, the A5127 and several other local roads.

It involves 21/2 miles (4km) of slip roads but only just over half a mile of the M6 motorway itself.

Many of the roadways are raised high in the air to accommodate three rivers, two railway lines and the junction of four canals beneath it. The structure features more than 550 concrete columns and some roads are 80ft (24m) in the air at their highest point.

National Highways director Melanie Clarke said: "Spa-



ghetti Junction is a special part of England's motorway network.

"It's something to be proud of in Birmingham because it's known all around the world – quite rightly – as a feat of engineering.

"When it was designed 50 years ago, nobody could have predicted that Gravelly Hill Interchange would carry around 200,000 vehicles every day."

Andy Street, mayor of the West Midlands Andy Street, added: "Spaghetti

> Junction has become an iconic Brummie landmark, so it's only right that we celebrate its 50th anniversary.

> "At the time of its inception, it was actually considered a real engineering feat - so much so that my grandfather used to take me to visit while it was being built."

> As part of the celebrations, Heinz have produced special cans of tinned spaghetti featuring the junction.

Prince Charles and the Duchess of Cornwall are to make a guest appearance in a television soap opera as part of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations.

Honouring the queen of fossils

>> Mary Anning statue unveiled

ary Anning, the 19th century fossil hunter, has been remembered with a new statue on the seafront of her home town Lyme Regis.

Her finds led to scientists understanding prehistoric life in the area of Dorset which became known as the Jurassic Coast.

Mary was only 12 when she discovered an ichthyosaur skeleton amid cliff landslides and she went on to find plesiosaur fossils and a pterosaur skeleton among many other finds.

The unveiling of the statue, created

Thousands of train enthusiasts queued through the night to be among the first passengers on a major new train line across London.

The Crossrail project connects west and east London and cuts journey times across the capital by half.

The line has been named the Elizabeth Line in honour of the Queen, who performed the official opening.

The first public service left Paddington at 6.31am and by 10am it had been used by 130,000 passengers according to the by sculptor Denise Dutton, comes at the end of a four-year campaign to honour Mary by a group called Mary Anning Rocks.

Among the leading campaigners was schoolgirl Evie Squire, who is now 15. She admitted she was not a big fan of fossils herself, but said: "The main reason I wanted to do it was to make sure she got the recognition she deserved."

Television anthropologist Professor Alice Roberts and naturalist David Attenborough were among the celebrities who supported the campaign.

As a woman from a poor background, Mary often did not get the credit for her discoveries, with interest in her work and life only growing after her death at the age of 47.

Fact SHED

Mary Anning

Mary was born in 1799 to a poor family in Lyme Regis. She was one of 10 children but only she and brother Joseph lived to become adults.

Her first major find, at the age of 12, was the first known example of an ichthyosaur ever found. She went on to find several more ichthyosaurs.

Mary also discovered two almost complete skeletons of plesiosaurs.

Among her other discoveries was the first pterosaur fossil ever found outside Germany. The name pterodactyl was introduced later.





THIS WEEK IN HISTORY MAY 29, 1953



he Queen's coronation was not the only big news on June 2, 1953.

It was on that morning that The Times newspaper in London reported that Mount Everest had finally been conquered, four days earlier on May 29.

The British-led expedition was the ninth attempt to reach the summit of the world's highest mountain at 29,031ft (8,848m), although neither of the first two men to finally succeed were British.

They were New Zealand mountaineer Edmund Hillary, accompanied by Tenzing Norgay of the Sherpa people in Nepal, many of them expert mountaineers.

Their success was the climax of a massive operation involving hundreds of people. Weeks earlier, in mid-March, two groups set off from the capital of Nepal, Kathmandu, the first with 150 porters carrying equipment and the second with 200.

They took two weeks to reach the village of Thyangboche, where the group stopped to acclimatise to the altitude.

Bike bonanza brings racers to island course

For a fortnight in June, the Isle of Man echoes to the roar of motorbikes in one of the world's most daunting and dangerous series of races.

The TT races – standing for Tourist Trophy – are run over a 37.73-mile (60.72km) course of public roads which are closed to traffic, running through the towns of Ramsey and Douglas, on country roads and over the famous mountain road close to the summit of Snaefell.

Unlike circuit races, where riders are protected by sandy run-off areas and padded walls of tyres in case of accidents, TT riders race at high speeds inches away from stone walls, trees and buildings.

It means the races are often criticised as being too dangerous, with 260 people killed in accidents down the years.



The races return this

year after being cancelled in 2020 and 2021 because of the Covid pandemic. Apart from that and during wartime, the races have been run every year since May 28, 1907.

The modern races, run in seven different classes over four or six laps, are very different to those early days.

Unlike most motorcycle races, when bikes start together and race alongside each other, the TT races are time trials with riders starting at intervals and the fastest time declared the winner.

Charlie Collier won the solitary race in 1907 at an average speed of 38.21mph (61.49kph), but the current record is an average speed of 135.452mph (217.989kph), set by BMW rider Peter Hickman in 2018.

The fastest recorded outright speed is 206mph, set by New Zealand veteran Bruce Anstey.

After a week of practice sessions, this year's races begin on Saturday, June 4, and run on alternate days until Friday, June 10.

ngland begin a busy summer of international cricket on Thursday under completely new leadership.

Former player Rob Key is the new managing director of England men's cricket, replacing Ashley Giles who was sacked after the 4-0 Ashes series drubbing in Australia last winter.

And one of Key's first acts was the surprise appointment of former New Zealand captain Brendon McCullum as coach of the Test team.

McCullum, who replaces the sacked Chris Silverwood, was a hugely successful player and captain for New Zealand but has little experience of coaching in first-class cricket.

England will have a new leader on the field as well, with all-rounder Ben Stokes taking over as captain from Joe Root, who stepped down after the series defeat in the West Indies earlier this year. Root stays in the team as a batsman.

Like McCullum, Stokes is also New Zealand-born, so England will have an all-Kiwi leadership when they start the summer's action against... New Zealand.

Key has decided to split the coaching duties for red- and white-ball cricket. While McCullum coaches the Test team, Key made another eye-catching appointment with Australia women's team coach Matthew Mott taking on the job for oneday internationals and Twenty20s.

England's highly successful ODI and T20 captain Eoin Morgan is the only senior figure to keep his role.

England start their season against New Zealand while the one-day team go to the Netherlands, followed by all-format series against India and South Africa.

England's squad for the first two Tests against New Zealand features two newcomers in Yorkshire batsman Harry Brook and Durham bowler Matthew Potts.
